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Working Principle

This assay employs the competitive inhibition enzyme immunoassay technique. Antibody specific for HBB has been pre-coated onto a microplate. Standards and samples are pipetted into the wells with biotin-conjugated HBB. A competitive inhibition reaction is launched between HBB (Standards or samples) and biotin-conjugated HBB with the pre-coated HBB antibody. After washing, avidin conjugated Horseradish Peroxidase (HRP) is added to the wells. Following a wash to remove any unbound reagent, a substrate solution is added to the wells and color develops in opposite to the amount of HBB bound in the initial step. At last, measure the intensity of color after stopping color development.

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Sensitivity

The minimum detectable dose of monkey HBB is less than 0.12 ng/ml.

The sensitivity of this assay, or Lower Limit of Detection (LLD) was

defined as the lowest monkey HBB concentration that could be

differentiated from zero.

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Specificity

This assay has high sensitivity and excellent specificity. No significant

cross-reactivity or interference between monkey HBB and analogues was

observed. Limited by current skills and knowledge, it is impossible for us

to complete the cross-reactivity detection between monkey HBB and all

the analogues, therefore, cross reaction may still exist.

Precision

Intra-assay Precision (Precision within an assay): CV%<8%

Three samples of known concentration were tested twenty times on one

plate to assess.

Inter-assay Precision (Precision between assays): CV%<10%

Three samples of known concentration were tested in twenty assays to

assess.

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Other Supplies Required

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Microplate reader capable of measuring absorbance at 450 nm,

with the correction wavelength set at 600 nm or 630 nm.

An incubator which can provide stable incubation conditions up to

37°C±0.5°C.

Squirt bottle, manifold dispenser, or automated microplate washer.

Absorbent paper for blotting the microtiter plate.

100ml and 500ml graduated cylinders.

Deionized or distilled water.

Pipettes and pipette tips.

Test tubes for dilution.

Sample Collection & Storage

Lysate for RBC Collect a certain volume of anticoagulant blood

sample (e.g. 1ml). Centrifuge at 10000rpm for 10min at 4°C to collect the

RBC. Remove supernate and add cold pure water to redissolve RBC to

the previous volume (e.g. 1ml). Then store at -20°C for about 30-60

minutes. After three freeze-thaw cycles to break up the cell membranes,

the cell lysates were centrifuged for 10 minutes at 10000rpm, 4°C, Collect

the supernatant. RBC lysates should be assayed immediately or

aliquotted and stored at -20°C. Centrifuge the sample again after thawing

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before the assay. Avoid repeated freeze-thaw cycles.

Sample Preparation

For lysate for RBC samples, recommend to determine the dilution factor

by pretest. The optimal dilution factor should be determined by users

according to their particular experiments.

Notes:

1. Biomatik is only responsible for the kit itself, not for the samples

consumed during the assay. The user need to calculate the possible

amount of the samples to be used in the whole test. Please reserve

sufficient samples in advance.

2. Samples to be used within 5 days may be stored at 2-8°C, otherwise.

samples must be stored at -20°C (≤1month) or -80°C (≤2month) to avoid

contamination and loss of bioactivity.

3. Grossly hemolyzed samples are not suitable to use.

4. It would be necessary to run a preliminary experiment for validation, if

the samples are not indicated in the manual.

5. Please predict the concentration before assaving. If results were not

within the range of the standard curve, users would need to estimate the

optimal sample dilutions for their particular experiments.

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6. Tissue or cell extraction samples prepared by chemical lysis buffer

may cause unexpected ELISA results due to the impacts of certain

chemicals

7. Considering the possibility of mismatch between antigen from other

resources and antibody in our kits (e.g., antibody targets conformational

epitope rather than linear epitope), some native or recombinant proteins

from other manufacturers may not be recognized by our products.

8. Due to factors including cell viability, cell number and sampling time.

samples from cell culture supernatant may not be detected by the kit.

9. Recommend to use fresh samples for the test. If you store samples for

long time, protein degradation and denaturalization may occur in those

samples and finally lead to wrong results.

Reagents Preparation

Kindly use graduated containers to prepare the reagent.

Bring all reagents to room temperature (18-25°C) before use for 30

mins

Prepare fresh standard for each assay. Use within 4 hours and

discard after use

Making serial dilution in the wells directly is not permitted.

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Distilled Water is recommended. Contaminated water or container for

reagents preparation will affect the test result.

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Biotin-conjugate (1x) - Centrifuge the vial before opening.

Biotin-conjugate requires a 100-fold dilution. A suggested 100-fold dilution

is 10 µl of Biotin-conjugate + 990 µl of Biotin-conjugate Diluent.

HRP-avidin (1x) - Centrifuge the vial before opening. HRP-avidin requires a

100-fold dilution. A suggested 100-fold dilution is 10 µl of HRP-avidin + 990

μl of HRP-avidin Diluent.

Wash Buffer (1x)- If crystals have formed in the concentrate, warm them up

to room temperature and mix them gently until they get completely dissolved.

Dilute 20 ml of Wash Buffer Concentrate (25 x) into deionized or distilled

water to prepare 500 ml of Wash Buffer (1 x).

Standard

Centrifuge the standard vial at 6000-10000rpm for 30s before opening.

Dilute the Standard(10x) with Sample Diluent. A suggested 10-fold dilution

is 30 µl of Standard(10x) + 270 µl of Sample Diluent. This diluted Standard

(S7) serves as the high standard (500 ng/ml).




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Do not substitute other diluents. Mix the standard to ensure complete dilution and allow the standard to sit for a minimum of 15 mins with gentle agitation prior to making dilutions.

Pipette 300 µl **Sample Diluent** into each tube (S0-S6). Use the diluted solution to produce a **4-fold** dilution series (below). Mix each tube thoroughly before the next transfer. **Sample Diluent** serves as the zero standard (0 ng/ml).



Key Notes

- Do not mix or substitute reagents with those from other lots or sources.
- If samples generate higher values than the highest standard, dilute the samples with Sample Diluent and repeat the assay.

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Any variation in Sample Diluent, operator, pipetting technique,

washing technique, incubation time or temperature, and kit age can

cause variation in binding.

This assay is designed to eliminate interference by soluble

receptors, binding proteins, and other factors present in biological

samples. Until all factors have been tested in the Immunoassay, the

possibility of interference cannot be excluded.

Precautions

The Stop Solution provided with this kit is an acid solution. Wear eye, hand, face,

and clothing protection when using this material.

Assav Procedures

Bring all reagents and samples to room temperature before use.

Centrifuge the sample again after thawing before the assay. It is

recommended to assay all samples and standards in duplicate.

1. Prepare all reagents, working standards, and samples as directed in

the previous sections.

2. Determine the number of wells to be used and put remaining wells and the

desiccant back into the pouch and seal the ziploc, store unused wells at 4°C.

3. Set a **Blank** well without any solution.

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Add 50µl Standard or Sample per well.

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5. Add 50ul Biotin-conjugate (1x) to each well immediately (Not to the

Blank well). Cover the microtiter plate with adhesive strip, Incubate at 37°C

for 40 mins. (Biotin-conjugate (1x) may appear cloudy. Warm up to room

temperature and mix gently until solution appears uniform.)

6. Aspirate each well and wash, repeating the process two times for a total of

three washes. Wash by filling each well with Wash Buffer (200ul) using a

squirt bottle, multi-channel pipette, manifold dispenser, or autowasher, and

let it stand for 2 mins. Complete removal of liquid at each step is essential to

good performance. After the last wash, remove any remaining Wash Buffer

by aspirating or decanting. Invert the plate and blot it against clean paper

towels.

7. Add 100µl HRP-avidin (1x) to each well (not to Blank well). Cover the

microtiter plate with a new adhesive strip. Incubate at 37°C for 40 mins.

8. Repeat the aspiration/wash process for five times as in step 6.

Add 90ul TMB Substrate to each well and mix well. Cover the microtiter.

plate with a new adhesive strip. Incubate at 37°C for 20 mins. Protect from

liaht.

10. Add 50ul **Stop Solution** to each well, gently tap the plate to ensure

thorough mixing.

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11. Determine the optical density of each well within 5 mins, using a

microplate reader set to 450 nm. If wavelength correction is available, set to

540 nm or 570 nm. Subtract readings at 540 nm or 570 nm from the readings

at 450 nm. This subtraction will correct for optical imperfections in the plate.

Readings made directly at 450 nm without correction may be higher and less

accurate.

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*Samples may require dilution. Please refer to Sample Preparation.

Notes:

1. The final experimental results will be closely related to validity of

products, operation skills of end users and the experimental

environments

2 Samples or reagents addition: Please use the freshly prepared

Standard. Please carefully add samples to wells and mix gently to avoid

foaming. Do not touch the well wall as possible. For each step in the

procedure, total dispensing time for addition of reagents or samples to

the assay plate should not exceed 10 mins. This will ensure equal

elapsed time for each pipetting step, without interruption. Duplication of

all standards and specimens, although not required, is recommended. To

avoid cross-contamination, change pipette tips between additions of each

standard level, between sample additions, and between reagent additions.



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Also, use separate reservoirs for each reagent.

3. Incubation: To ensure accurate results, proper adhesion of plate

sealers during incubation steps is necessary. Do not allow wells to sit

uncovered for extended periods between incubation steps. Once

reagents have been added to the well strips, DO NOT let the strips DRY

at any time during the assay. Incubation time and temperature must be

observed.

4. Washing: The wash procedure is critical. Complete removal of

liquid at each step is essential to good performance. After the last wash,

remove any remaining Wash Solution by aspirating or decanting and

remove any drop of water and fingerprint on the bottom of the plate.

remove any grop or water and imperprint on the bettern or the plate.

Insufficient washing will result in poor precision and falsely elevated

absorbance reading. When using an automated plate washer, adding a

30 second soak period following the addition of wash buffer, and/or

rotating the plate 180 degrees between wash steps may improve assay

precision.

5. Controlling of reaction time: Observe the change of color after

adding TMB Substrate (e.g. observation once every 10 mins), TMB

Substrate should change from colorless or light blue to gradations of blue.

If the color is too deep, add Stop Solution in advance to avoid excessively

strong reaction which will result in inaccurate absorbance reading.

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TMB Substrate is easily contaminated. TMB Substrate should 6.

remain colorless or light blue until added to the plate. Please protect it

from light.

7. Stop Solution should be added to the plate in the same order as

the TMB Substrate. The color developed in the wells will turn from blue to

yellow upon addition of the Stop Solution. Wells that are green in color

indicate that Stop Solution has not mixed thoroughly with TMB Substrate.

Calculation of Results

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Using the professional soft "Curve Expert" to make a standard

curve is recommended, which can be downloaded from our web.

Average the duplicate readings for each standard and sample and

subtract the average optical density of Blank.

Create a standard curve by reducing the data using computer software

capable of generating a four parameter logistic (4-PL) curve-fit. As an

alternative, construct a standard curve by plotting the mean absorbance

for each standard on the x-axis against the concentration on the y-axis

and draw a best fit curve through the points on the graph. The data may

be linearized by plotting the log of the HBB concentrations versus the log



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of the O.D. and the best fit line can be determined by regression analysis.

This procedure will produce an adequate but less precise fit of the data.

If samples have been diluted, the concentration read from the standard curve must be multiplied by the dilution factor.
